#### **Go and Tell** by Roger Slack

In the past few days, I have been listening to and reading Paul's letter to the Ephesians. The letter was one of those written while Paul was in prison in Rome. The first chapter struck me as not what you would expect that a man in chains in prison would write. It is almost as if he is on an emotional high, exuberant in his pride in them and also his desires for them. Verses 15 to 19 stood out to me, as he expresses his love and desires for them: "For this reason I too, having heard of the faith in the Lord Jesus which exists among you, and your love for all the saints, do not cease giving thanks for you, while making mention of you in my prayers; that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of Him. I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened, so that you may know what is the hope of His calling, what are the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints, and what is the surpassing greatness of His power toward us who believe." It doesn't sound much like a man beaten down with no hope. In Paul's letter to the

Philippians, he mentions that his imprisonment in the cause of Christ was being made known throughout the whole Praetorian guard. I'm sure the soldiers guarding him, at first, had a hard time figuring out what made this guy tick. The word soon spread to the point that even some in Caesar's household became Christians. I would hope that we as a congregation would pray for our people, our children and young people, and our neighbors around us what Paul prayed for the Ephesians that each might know joy and peace and freedom in their day-to-day lives.

# Elizabeth Circle Shares an Article from the Magazine *Living Lutheran...*

In a culture where Christians and Muslims live side by side in the same communities, and sometimes the same households, Kristin Engstrom finds that Christmas is for all: "It is beyond anyone's comprehension that you would ever exclude someone from a celebration or meal because they're of a different faith."

Local markets sell Christmas trees; tinsel appears on doors and cars; and in schools of the Senegalese Lutheran Development Service, both Christian and Muslim students celebrate the end of term with a Christmas program featuring songs and presentations from their cultural traditions. *Père Noël* (Father Christmas) arrives to dance by the tree and give gifts (provided by parents) to every child.

For Engstrom, Christmas is a sign of how "in а Senegalese context, for both Christians and Muslims. God is at the center of life...here in Senegal, people have SO much grace."

Christ Lutheran Celebrates "Fat Tuesday" with a Goal of Collecting Three Tons of Food for the Stoughton Food Pantry



Did you know that "Mardi Gras" is French for "Fat Tuesday"? It comes from the tradition of slaughtering and feasting upon the fatted calf the day before Lent, because with Lent came a forty-day fast during which all Christians in the early days, then Catholics following the Reformation, gave up eating meat. Mardi Gras has also been called "Carnival," and *carnival* comes from the Latin words *carne vale*, meaning "farewell to the flesh."

It is not a Lutheran tradition to give up anything or "fast" during Lent. The Ash Wednesday liturgy encourages us to focus instead on "acts of love." So beginning Sunday, January 7, Christ Lutheran will begin collecting food for the Stoughton Food Pantry and continue collecting through Fat Tuesday, February 13. We have more time this year, since Lent begins so late. Decorated paper bags will be handed out for you to take home (filled with a Thrivent "Live Generously" t-shirt). Thrivent will be helping us reach our goal by donating \$250 worth of groceries. This year our goal is 3 tons or 6,000 pounds. How is that for a challenge? Last year we collected 2½ tons. That was more than we have ever collected before. Can we collect 3 tons? Bob the Builder would say, "**Yes, We Can!**"
