Go and Tell by Roger Slack

Each Sunday, as part of our church service, we confess the Apostles' Creed. The third portion of this creed starts, "I believe in the Holy Spirit " For me, that always seemed to end rather abruptly as to what the Holy Spirit does and has already done. The things that the Holy Spirit has done are told throughout the Bible in many ways and involving many people. Some knew what the Holy Spirit was doing for and through them, but others did not know until afterwards. God was honored and praised as a result in either situation. I love the account of Simeon in the temple when Mary and Joseph brought Jesus in at eight days of age to offer the temple offering of two turtledoves for the life of a son born first into a family. Luke's account, 2:26, says that it had been revealed by the Holy Spirit to Simeon that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. It doesn't say how he knew. He just had a reassurance that he would live long enough to see God keep His promise and send His Christ to save his people. We don't know what Simeon was expecting to see either. I know if it were me, I would have been expecting someone like King David of old or Alexander the Great to come on the scene, already made. Instead, Simeon feels the need to go into the temple that day. Once he sees Mary and Joseph



present their offering to God, he knows absolutely that this baby is God's Christ. This was the beginning of something great and wonderful, and how appropriate that it be a baby, pure and unstained. I know many of us, if we think about it, have seen God lead us and direct us to a place in our lives where we thought we were there for one reason, only to find God had other plans. I met my wife in a dentist chair. Not at all what I was expecting, but sure glad God did.

That third portion of the Apostles' Creed goes on: "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting." As I begin to realize, the remainder of the confession is the result of what the Holy Spirit is doing in us in the past, today, and in our lives yet to come.

Saturday, June 9, Steeple to Steeple-Ride for Hunger 2018 benefiting ELCA World Hunger.

- 7:00 a.m.—100 km/62-mile Metric Century
- 8:00 a.m.—30-mile ride
- 9:00 a.m.—Family Ride, 12 bike path miles

Starts and ends at All Saints Lutheran Church, 2951 Chapel Valley Rd., Fitchburg, WI 53711. Registration is \$30 for adults and \$10 for children 16 and younger. To see routes and register, go to www.steepleride.com. CLC is a host church for the "Steeple Ride," which stops at Christ Lutheran for refreshments. Pastor Scott intends to host the bikers as he has in the past. If you are available to be at CLC to keep the doors (restrooms) open from about 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., tell Pastor Scott you can back him up as needed. If you'd like to bring a homemade treat for the 62-milers that stop at CLC, also let Pastor Scott know. CLC is near the end of the longest ride. At that stage, the bikers are desiring water, Gatorade, fruit juice, fresh cut-up oranges, bananas, cookies, or power bars, and they will reload their water bottles for the ride back to Fitchburg. Extending credit for biking that far and encouragement to finish would be a bonus.

Sunday, July 15, 1:00 p.m., CLC bike ride on the Badger State Trail, starting in Belleville, WI, and going south toward the tunnel. This ride is off-road and family-safe for all ages. Depending on your skill or ambition, you can travel to the tunnel, to Monticello, or further—state trails require a trail pass for people 16 or older (youth are free). Joyeuses Pâques!

This late April blog post comes from YAGM Lily (or Salane Ndour, her Senegalese name). Lily is living this year in Foundiougne, a river town and transport hub in central Senegal. In Foundiougne, Lily serves with the Department of Community Development of the Lutheran Church of Senegal, and as you will read in her blog post about Senegalese Holy Week traditions, lives with a Roman Catholic host family.

Happy Easter! Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Holy Week and Easter in Senegal brought about a busy schedule of church services and festive preparations. The greatest privilege was to witness and participate in the different ways my family and friends celebrate the Easter season in Senegal.

While the Maundy Thursday service included the traditional foot washing, Good Friday brought a myriad of new experiences.

I woke up to my host family and some neighbors already busy in the ngalax (en-gahl-ah) making process. Ngalax is a drink comprised of the powdered fruit from the baobab tree, a thin paste made from peanuts, millet flour soaked and mixed with water, sugar, and my family elected to add raisins, banana flavoring, and shaved coconut. It's delicious. If I had to compare the taste to something familiar in a U.S. context, I would say it tastes like a peanut butter and jelly sandwich smoothie. As my host mom and her friends put the drink into any sort of container we could find, my siblings and I went out to distribute ngalax to our neighbors. Muslim and Christians alike receive ngalax for the holiday. Food is a medium used in all religious holidays to bring people together. Whether it's couscous for Tamkharit or ngalax for Easter, no one is left out of a religious celebration.

In the middle of the afternoon, we made the long, very hot trek to the church where we witnessed the youth of the parish in a reenactment of the Passion. My host brother, Ibou, and our resident priest in training, Moise, were involved, as well as Ndew and Madou, my younger sisters. After the performance, we processed into the church. Instead of communion that night, the line processed forward to take turns kissing a large crucifix.

Saturday was a day of preparing a large meal of pork for the evening. The same meal was prepared in smaller bowls with chicken to distribute to our Muslim neighbors. All of us spent the day taking turns snacking on the ngalax that had been brought to us the day before. We ate a delicious meal of grilled pork kebabs served on a fresh salad before we headed off to the Easter vigil service. This service was the pinnacle of the Easter weekend. Everyone dressed in their best. The service began just outside the front doors of the church. A bonfire had been made from which the new Paschal candle was lit. From the Paschal candle everyone lit individual candles, and we processed into the sanctuary. The beginning of the service had the mournful, solemn tone one would expect. But as we drew closer to midnight, a shift in tone came to the service. Soon the bells of the church were ringing and the choir was singing loudly "Jésus est ressuscité" (Jesus is risen!). After the service, everyone greeted each other with kisses on the cheek and proclamations of "Alleluia!"

Easter Sunday found our church going crew in their matching fabric on our way to Mass. A day of relaxation, ngalax, and cold, freshly made juices followed.

Senegal is a deeply religious country. Whether Muslim or Christian, religion interacts with almost all aspects of everyday life. To experience a different culture is to already be given a great honor and privilege. I feel so honored to have been able to share in these religious festivities so important to my host family and community. The true gift of a cross-cultural experience lies in the learned ability to see your own culture through a different lens. Traditions surround festivities in every culture, but these traditions look different. Each culture holds tightly to these traditions as identifiers, as the way in which we relate to the world around us. To experience Easter in this new way was a beautiful reminder of the boundless promise of Jesus' resurrection. This promise is not bound to those who celebrate with ngalax or those who eat chemically colored eggs. As Christians around the world celebrate the Easter season in their own traditions, we celebrate the diversity of God's people and the promise of resurrection extended to them all.
