
New Lay Ministry Administrator Hired

CLC's Living Legacy—Claire "Kelly" Wright

How many people do **you** know who have been a member of the **same** congregation for 95 years? How many of those people can claim that both their parents **and** their grandparents were members of the **same** congregation since the 19th century? Christ Lutheran is proud to claim Claire "Kelly" Wright, son of Harry and Emma Otteson Wright, grandson of Otto and Anna Otteson, as our living legend, and possibly the member with the longest affiliation with our congregation. Baptized at Christ Lutheran on June 15, 1924, and confirmed in 1940 (Kelly remembers Pastor Topness conducting the confirmation service), he shyly shares that he did get married in a Lutheran church in Janesville, but proudly claims Christ Lutheran as his "home church." Continuing the tradition on to the fourth generation, Kelly's daughter

Rebecca currently claims Christ Lutheran as her home congregation, too. But it doesn't end there. Kelly's CLC relatives include Mary Sime, Nancy Holzhuter, Mary Jo Iverson, Matthew Iverson, Anne Iverson, Milt Sperle, Jane Runge, and who knows how many more!

Following his WWII service in Operations with the Air Force, stationed in the Pacific, Kelly came home and married Flo Runey in 1948. Daughters Denise, Rebecca, Wanda, and Cathryn followed. Flo passed away in 1997. Even though his employment took him outside the city of Stoughton, working first for Chevrolet and then for Oscar Mayer in the shipping department, Kelly remained committed to his hometown and to his home church.


Before the days when Bible School and Luther League were incorporated into the life of the church, Kelly remembers the congregation as being much smaller, evolving from the wooden structure on East Main to the remodeled brick structure that was destroyed by fire, to today, where he enjoys the monthly Senior Luncheons, confessing that he's only missed "one or two" since their inception.

Sharing a recent Senior Luncheon with CLC members 20 years his junior, Kelly happily recalls the days when Roger Utermark was his mail carrier, and when he had his own paper route delivering the *Hub*. When asked what he attributes to his longevity, Kelly is quick to say that having plenty of work has led to a "good life." Thank you, Claire "Kelly" Wright for your lifelong commitment and dedication to Christ Lutheran Church. You truly are the Living Legacy of CLC.

I'm surprised Peter didn't ask Jesus, "The question is not 'Do I love You?' but rather 'Do You still love me?' Jesus' answer was obvious, as after each question, Jesus in essence said, "I still have work for you to do. Feed my sheep." To feel Jesus' forgiveness and be made right again was probably the greatest gift Peter could have ever received. Talk about motivation for us all!

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Lutheran Liturgy: "The Passing of the Peace"

When I was younger, my little brother and I fought all the time. Like, quite literally, all the time. And it wasn't pretty fighting. There was sitting on each other. There were low punches, and hair-pulling, and pinching. On one occasion, there was a knife pointed at someone, and at another point we broke a lamp. I'm pretty sure there's a crack in my bedroom door from him kicking it while I mounted a defense. This fighting was relentless. It was seven days a week, 24 hours Monday through Saturday, and, thanks to the "no physical altercation" rule in church, 23 hours on Sunday. On Sunday, during the church service, there was a precious hour (usually a little less than) that we had to sit shoulder-to-shoulder and not fight. And, in a seemingly cosmic joke, we would even occasionally have to share the peace with one another.

That's right. My worst enemy, would have to look each other in the eye and tell the other person "peace be with you." Because guess what? God doesn't care about sibling squabbles (unless it is Cain and Abel) and so you better put on your big-girl or big-boy pants and embrace the person next to you. Even if they're your little brother.

(Luke and I have since grown out of this, and we actually get along quite well. Like, we spend time together willingly. Mom is very proud of our character growth.)

See, here's the thing with the passing of the peace—for all I've talked about how liturgy ties us together as a community and a living church, we don't actually really interact with each other a whole lot. The passing of the peace is a moment in worship where we take time to really recognize one another. It is a moment (without coffee) that we can check in with them and share words from scripture with them.

The words for the passing of the peace come from Philippians 4:7, which states that "the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." When we share these words with each other, we are arming each other with God's courage and strength until we meet with them again. It is a "Hey, I don't know what you're going through now, or what you're going to go through, but may God be with you, and may you be this embodied peace and fortitude for whatever you have to deal with."

The passing of the peace is a moment where we break down the jigsaw puzzle that makes up the church. It simultaneously breaks the focus from the ideological community (which is so easy to make into a fantasy) and pulls you out of the individual-centric mindset of society. You take a step back and you look at yourself, and you look at your church community, and you wish a peace unto each other that surpasses all understanding.

Also, though, it is a great way to pass germs during flu season, so y'know, feel free to spice it up with fist bumps or waves instead of handshakes and hugs. Also, be cognizant of differently abled people who may have difficulty moving or don't want to be touched. There are so many ways to pass the peace and share this moment as a living church community that it shouldn't be limited to one set way.

Live Into the Discomfort

On our long car ride home from the March YAGM retreat, we played a game where we had to come up with a "tagline" for each person in the YAGM cohort. It was decided that mine would be "live into the discomfort." Little did I realize how much I use this phrase in my conversations here in Senegal, particularly when encouraging the YAGM to stay present, take another look, and engage again in a difficult situation, relationship, or unjust system.

I remember telling Rachel to "live into the discomfort" when she worried that she was too much of a burden on her host family and they were too generous with what she deemed insufficient resources.

I remember telling Andrew that I wasn't going to answer his questions about the right way to be a YAGM because he needed to muddle through the discomfort of living out the answer.

And I have to tell myself to "live into the discomfort" when, upon returning from my trip to the U.S. in April, friends and colleagues ask me where their present is; and I have to remember the privilege I have to travel and to be able to share with others. And most discomforting of all, since it is the cultural norm in Senegal for someone who has traveled to bring presents back for everyone, the honor of being invited to live into the often awkward-for-me cultural norms of Senegal by my friends and colleagues.

Discomfort, which I'm not even sure is a word, is a way of life for the Senegal YAGM and for me. I've come to believe that living into the discomfort is good practice for living our Christian faith. After all, I never feel so uncomfortable as when the Holy Spirit sticks her nose into my life and asks me to let go of my comfort, my wants, and my way of life to follow the ways of someone else—Jesus the Christ.

May we all be called to "live into the discomfort" of the Easter season.
