
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Go and Tell

Like the letter Paul wrote to the Romans, 1st Corinthians is a long letter in which Paul covers a variety of issues that were going on in the young church at the time. As I read it, it sounds as if a period of chaos had overtaken them in Paul's absence. Paul had been there with them for a year and a half before moving on back to Ephesus and on to



Damascus. Paul would often receive word via messengers or actual letters with questions from the new churches about things that in the short times he had been with them, Paul had either not touched on or they had forgotten or misunderstood. Corinth, Greece was a "sailors town" as they had harbors on both the east and west side of the city. The temple of Aphrodite, Greek goddess of love, with its temple prostitutes overlooked the city and played a part in the environment that the new church grew up in. An old friend of mine, years ago, described himself before getting married to his wife as "pretty rough cut". I laughed at the description but knew he was very appreciative of his wife even considering marrying him all those years before. I can't help but think many of the people in Corinth fit into that description as well.

Paul tells them that when he was with them, he had to deal with them as infants in Christ and not as mature adults, and they still are "little kids that want to be grown up". There were divisions among them as to who they were following. Some wanted Paul. Others wanted Apollo, a colleague of Paul. Others were familiar more with Peter and still some got it right wanting to be a follower of Jesus. Then there was the one man who had taken his father's wife as his own. What's going on? Even the Gentiles didn't do that. Also there were lawsuits among the Christians and they took them to court before nonbelievers. Quite the witness to the world around them. Then there is almost like a competition among them as to the gifts of the Holy Spirit: Apostles, prophets, miracle workers, healers, speaking in tongues and others. Paul mentions in some of his letters, of praying in tears for his congregations. I can't help but think this was one of them. "Dear God, How can they screw things up so badly?"

Then comes Chapter 13, where Paul reorients them as to what is the objective, what they should be aiming at in their lives to bring back order and a unity in the church. All the things that they admired and thought would put them in a position of honor and respect in the church would mean nothing if they did not reach out in love. If we do nothing else in life but this, we have succeeded in bringing honor and glory to God and Jesus.


you, Dave Erdman) took pity on me and let me go so I could buy some beignets.

Also, the Lord's Prayer, as we say it, is something that is consistent across Christian traditions. We all say it (with exception to Jehovah's witnesses), and we all basically say the same thing. And that doesn't just mean that we ELCA Lutherans say the same thing as Missouri synod Lutherans. Ethiopian Orthodox say the Lord's Prayer. Universalists say the prayer. Justin Beiber says the Lord's Prayer at his somewhat culty Hillsong church in Hollywood. No matter the class or the location, all Christians say this prayer as a reminder of Jesus and his words.

And what of those words, Sophie? What are they if you peel back the years of rote memorization and recitation? Well, basically, it is us remembering what is good and just, what we should celebrate and do and how we can walk with God. It is also acknowledging that there will be bad stuff--trespasses or sins or wrongs against us--that we have to move through. And we ask God to help us with that. But we also take a moment to worship God, to pronounce the holiness and sanctity of our relationship with God--for the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, hallowed be your name, your will be done, etc.

The Lord's Prayer is what you make of it, in all honesty. It can be something that pulls you closer to God, to Jesus, to the global church, to the past church, to your worshipping congregation. But it can also just be a thing you try to remember and say when nudged in church. So, you know, you do you.

YOUTH GROUP

MISSION TRIP JAMAICA 2019

The trip was awesome! Half the group were new participants, half were youth and adults returning to Jamaica. We knew why we were there and we were ready to go to work.

Half the group worked at West Haven Children's Home, a home for disabled children. The other half worked on a house for Jabobe (Formally Habitat for Humanity). At the children's home we spent six hours a day for four days helping out in any way we could, feeding and helping dress residents as well as just giving them some one on one time. A number of the youth helped Jeff Peterson with a work project. A fence was erected around the garbage and laundry area to keep the goats out. The work there was not as physical as the house, but even the youth discovered it was more emotionally draining.

The youth and adults building the house had the floor done the first day, the walls, siding and roof rafters completed the second day, the roof, additional painting and trim finished the third day and the doors were hung the last day. You can't see the color the house was painted in the black and white photograph, but it is bright yellow. The house was only 12' x 16' with no indoor plumbing or electricity, but it looked like a mansion compared to some of the homes only 20 feet away. The entire group worked on the house at some point during the week and you could feel their pride and joy when Sheryl Simms, a single mother and new homeowner, and Mission Jamaica got together on Monday morning to bless the house and hand over the key. The pride and joy came from not only the work they had accomplished, but the legend they had lived. The only shirt most of us wore while working was our Thrivent "Live Generously" t-shirts. We had "lived generously." For the past school year with the help of the congregation we had raised \$6000 to cover the cost of the house and for four days, six hours a day in 95 to 100 degree temperatures we had freely given of our time and talents. It felt mighty good. We checked our funds for the Mission Trip and discovered that on top of the house we were able to donate \$1065 to West Haven Children's Home.

Our campaign to donate items to the Lutheran World Relief Organization has started a little early this year because the date for shipment out of Madison has been moved up to September 14th. So everything has to be ready to go by no later than the week of September 8th.

Some background for those of you who have not heard about Lutheran World Relief is that it is an organization that was started by Lutheran's in the United States following World War II. They started the organization because following the war about one-fifth of the Lutherans in the world were homeless. The organization continued and they have operated wherever the need has been for the past seventy-five years. Currently, they work in East and West Africa, Latin America, Asia and the Middle East.

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Include the following items in each Personal Care Kit:

One-light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color recommended

Two- or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping

One-adult-size toothbrush in it's original packaging*

One-sturdy comb, remove packaging

One-metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

*Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope; no plastic bags or wrap.



Include the following items in each Baby Care Kit:

Two-lightweight cotton t-shirts (no Onesies ®)

Two-long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)

Two-receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, between 36" and 52" square

Four-cloth diapers, flat fold preferred

One-jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap Two-pairs of socks

One-hand towel, dark color recommended

Two or three-bath-size bars of gentle soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original

wrapping; no mini or hotel size

Two-diaper pins or large safety pins



Include the following items in each School Kit:

Four-70-sheet notebooks of wide-or college-ruled paper, approximately 8" x 10 ½"; no loose leaf paper

One-30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other

One-pencil sharpener

One-pair of blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)

Five-unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers

Five-black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink)

One-box of 16 or 24 crayons

one- 2 1/2" eraser

One-sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" x 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks)

























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CLIFF SWALLOWS IN OUR ENTRYWAY



Anyone that has visited the church over the past couple of months has noticed that we are now home to a colony of nesting cliff swallows. These birds have built nests in our entryway and around the building. The birds commonly called cliff swallows or *Hirundo pyrrhonota* are protected by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918. This means that it's illegal to capture, kill, or disrupt the birds, their nests and their eggs.

Cliff Swallows require four basic things in the environment for a colony to choose a nesting site and they are: an open habitat for foraging, a vertical surface beneath an overhang for attaching their nest, a supply of mud that has the proper consistency for nest building and a body of fresh water for drinking. We have the perfect environment in and around the church which is why they have chosen our church as a nesting site. We had a couple of nests last year and earlier this year we had a couple more nests. We have discovered that the cliff swallows have a homing tendency which mean that they return again and again to the same site and we have also discovered that they bring swallows from other colonies with them when they return in successive years. They also tend to breed in waves and when a new wave comes in they like to reuse old nests if they are available.

We cannot do anything at this time to get rid of the current colony of swallows because they have already nested, but we are meeting with experts and looking into ways to prevent them from nesting here in the future. In the meantime, please note that they are not aggressive and will often fly away when they see someone approaching. Rod has been coming in daily to clean up the area bellow their nests to make everything as clean as possible. So please be patient while they are residing here.

During June of 2019, our pantry served 297 patrons from families in need and, year to date, has distributed a total of 64,456 pounds of food.



LADIES OF THE ELIZABETH CIRCLE HAVE "CURB APPEAL" By Diane Matson

As Paul Harvey might say, "And here's the rest of the story"......Several years ago, Elizabeth Circle adopted the flower bed that surrounds the Christ Lutheran Church sign located on the front lawn of the church property. The Circle purchases the flowers, plants the flowers, weeds the flowers, and waters the flowers when God is too busy to send rain.

Elizabeth Circle meets monthly from September through May. An offering is taken at each meeting, and in addition to supporting a missionary in Senegal, and donating to several non-profit organizations, members may choose to designate a portion of their offering to sustain the flower garden. The only other source of income for Elizabeth Circle comes from serving funeral lunches.

So what does all of this have to do with "curb appeal"? When the flower garden was planted originally, stiff rubber edging was used to outline the bed. The edging has outlived its usefulness, and grass and weeds are continually invading the garden space. Consequently, on September 11 at 7:30 a.m., a permanent decorative poured and stamped concrete flat-to-the-ground curb will be laid and the edging will be removed.

The Elizabeth Circle is humbly asking for additional financial support for this project in order not to infringe on our responsibilities to our missionary and to the non-profits that we support.
